I. INTRODUCTION

1. Goran Hadžić participated in a joint criminal enterprise (“JCE”) to permanently remove¹ Croats and other non-Serbs from large parts of the Republic of Croatia (“Croatia”). The result was the forcible expulsion of hundreds of thousands of non-Serbs from Serb-claimed territory in Croatia. Thousands of non-Serbs were murdered, detained in brutal conditions, cruelly treated and tortured. The homes and villages of non-Serbs were also wantonly destroyed, their property was plundered and a range of other persecutory acts were committed with the aim of forcing non-Serbs from the targeted territories.

2. Hadžić was a prominent Croatian Serb political leader throughout the Indictment² period. He rose to prominence through his close connection with Serbian President Slobodan Milošević. Hadžić was appointed President of the self-declared Serbian Autonomous District (“SAO”) of Slavonia, Baranja and Western Srem (“SBWS”),³ located in north-eastern Croatia, on 25 June 1991.⁴ As a result of this appointment, Hadžić was the pre-eminent political figure in the SAO SBWS. After the SAO SBWS joined the Republic of Serbian Krajina (“RSK”)⁵ on 26 February 1992, Hadžić was elected President, a position he held until December 1993.⁶ Hadžić significantly contributed to the JCE in numerous ways including by establishing and leading entities that implemented the common criminal purpose, formulating and enacting policies that advanced JCE goals, actively participating in the charged crimes and encouraging the commission of crimes by others.

3. In addition to committing crimes as a member of the JCE, Hadžić planned, ordered, instigated and aided and abetted the crimes charged in the Indictment.⁷ Hadžić is also liable as a superior for the charged crimes.⁸

II. THE JOINT CRIMINAL ENTERPRISE (JCE)

A. Common criminal purpose

4. From no later than 25 June 1991 until at least December 1993, Hadžić pursued the common criminal purpose to permanently remove a majority of the Croat and other non-Serb population from a large part of the territory of Croatia. Hadžić implemented this plan through a devastating persecutory campaign of violence.⁹ He acted together with Croatian Serb and Serbian political and military leaders, high-ranking members of the Yugoslav People's Army ("JNA") and the Ministry of Internal Affairs of Serbia ("MUP Serbia"), and other Serb and Croatian Serb leaders.

B. Hadžić was a JCE member

5. Hadžić was Milošević's man on the ground in Croatia. Before the conflict Hadžić had been a warehouse clerk.¹⁰ His relationship with Milošević led him to head the SAO SBWS government in June 1991 and to become RSK President in February 1992.¹¹

6. As SAO SBWS President, Hadžić was the ultimate political authority in the region.¹² He represented the SAO SBWS at Socialist Federal Republic of Yugoslavia ("SFRY") Presidency meetings¹³ and in international negotiations,¹⁴ and led and co-ordinated SAO SBWS bodies domestically.¹⁵ As RSK President, Hadžić exercised executive authority over the RSK government, police and military.¹⁶ He frequently attended Serbian military and political gatherings,¹⁷ represented the RSK in international negotiations¹⁸ and held himself out as the highest authority in the RSK.¹⁹

7. From 1991, Hadžić made clear his intentions to create an ethnically-separate Serb state.²⁰ He openly advocated using violence against Croats and other non-Serbs to achieve this goal.²¹ In calling on Serbs from Serbia to fight to “liberate” SBWS in September 1991, Hadžić stated that they would have “no mercy” on the “Ustasha”.²²

8. Hadžić shared the common criminal purpose²³ and significantly contributed to its implementation in several ways, including by:²⁴

- Establishing and leading government bodies which implemented and facilitated the common criminal purpose;²⁵
- Formulating and implementing governmental policies intended to advance the common purpose;²⁶
- Providing financial, material and logistical assistance to the Serb Forces and facilitating their operations in furtherance of the common purpose;²⁷
- Actively participating in crimes against non-Serbs;²⁸
- Encouraging the commission of crimes against non-Serbs by creating an environment of impunity;²⁹ and
- Failing to uphold his legal duties to protect the non-Serb population in the areas under his authority.³⁰

C. Other JCE members

9. In addition to Hadžić, the following individuals shared the common criminal purpose and participated in its implementation:

- President **Slobodan Milošević** was the leading figure in the JCE. Milošević achieved dominance by manipulating Serbian nationalist policies—the essence of which was that Serbs must live in territory controlled by Serbs.³¹
- **Jovica Stanišić** was the Chief of the State Security Service (“SDB”) of MUP Serbia.³² **Franko Simatović** *a.k.a.* Frenki functioned as his deputy.³³ Stanišić and Simatović were subordinated to Milošević³⁴ and controlled and co-ordinated the arming, training and deployment of volunteer formations, including Arkan’s Tigers, in SBWS, SAO Krajina and later in the RSK.³⁵
- **Željko Ražnatović** *a.k.a.* Arkan, a known criminal,³⁶ was the leader of the paramilitary group known as Arkan’s Tigers.³⁷
- **Radovan Stojičić** *a.k.a.* Badža, a MUP Serbia official,³⁸ commanded SAO SBWS Territorial Defence (“TO”) and police units from August 1991.³⁹ For his role in the SBWS takeover, Stojičić was promoted to Head of the Public Security Section (“SJB”) and Deputy Minister of MUP Serbia on 31 December 1991.⁴⁰
- **Milan Babić**, a regional Croatian Serb politician, became President of the newly-created SAO Krajina on 29 May 1991.⁴¹ On 19 December 1991, when the SAO Krajina proclaimed itself the RSK, Babić became its first President.⁴²
- **Milan Martić** was appointed SAO Krajina Minister of Defence by Babić on 29 May 1991.⁴³ Martić later became SAO Krajina Minister of the Interior.⁴⁴ After he was appointed RSK Minister of the Interior on 26 February 1992, he became Hadžić’s direct subordinate. Martić organised the training and financing of SAO Krajina police units and the *Martićevci*

(Martić’s Men),⁴⁵ which committed crimes in the SAO Krajina and the RSK during the Indictment period.

- **Radmilo Bogdanović** was the MUP Serbia Minister in 1991.⁴⁶ He then became a Member of the Serbian Parliament in charge of the committee for Serbs outside Serbia.⁴⁷ After resigning as MUP Minister, Bogdanović remained an influential figure within the MUP.⁴⁸
- **Mihalj Kertes** *a.k.a.* Braca, was a Serbian Parliament member in 1991⁴⁹ and the Deputy Federal MUP Minister in 1992.⁵⁰ He was closely associated with Stanišić, Simatović, Milošević and other members of the Serbian leadership.⁵¹
- General **Veljko Kadijević** headed the Federal Secretariat of People’s Defence (“SSNO”),⁵² an executive command and control body in charge of defence strategic planning and preparations.⁵³ Kadijević was Supreme Command Chief of Staff until early-January 1992.⁵⁴
- General **Blagoje Adžić** was Chief of Staff of the SFRY Armed Forces and Commander of the General Staff,⁵⁵ the highest organ for the JNA’s preparation and engagement.⁵⁶ He became Supreme Command Chief of Staff and acting SSNO Head in early 1992.⁵⁷
- **Vojislav Šešelj** was the President of the Serbian Radical Party (“SRS”) and the leader of the Serbian Chetnik Movement (“SČP”).⁵⁸ He advocated for a Serb-only Greater Serbia and called for retaliation against Croats for crimes committed against Serbs in World War II (“WWII”),⁵⁹ echoing the anti-Croat sentiments voiced by Hadžić.⁶⁰

10. Serb Forces⁶¹ linked to JCE members were among the principal perpetrators of the crimes charged in the Indictment. These forces were either JCE members because they shared the common criminal purpose, or they were used by JCE members to carry out the *actus reus* of crimes forming part of the common criminal purpose or which were the natural and foreseeable consequences of its execution.

D. Hadžić worked with other JCE members to create ethnic-Serb territories in Croatia

11. Throughout the Indictment period, Hadžić worked with other JCE members to create ethnic-Serb territories in Croatia.

12. Hadžić collaborated with Milošević and implemented the policies designed in Belgrade.⁶² He frequently visited Belgrade⁶³ and met with Milošević. He returned from these meetings with instructions from Milošević, which he implemented.⁶⁴ Milošević publicly acknowledged having “innumerable contacts” with the Croatian Serb leadership, and supplying arms and personnel to Croatian Serbs.⁶⁵

13. Hadžić had close links to MUP Serbia, including Bogdanović and Stanišić⁶⁶ – who provided financial and material support to Serbs in Croatia.⁶⁷ Hadžić co-ordinated with Bogdanović for the SAO SBWS police force to be financed and equipped by MUP Serbia.⁶⁸ Hadžić also met frequently with the Chief of the Novi Sad SDB and Stanišić.⁶⁹

14. From at least the summer of 1991, Stojičić was in regular contact with Hadžić and Arkan. The three met every few days in Erdut.⁷⁰ Stojičić met almost daily with the JNA Novi Sad Corps (“NS Corps”) to co-ordinate joint TO-JNA actions.⁷¹ Stojičić attended meetings in Hadžić’s office⁷² and gave briefings at SAO SBWS government meetings on the military situation on the ground.⁷³

15. Arkan and Hadžić were close collaborators.⁷⁴ Their respective headquarters in Erdut were located in the same compound.⁷⁵ Despite Arkan’s notorious criminality, Hadžić openly aligned

himself with him.⁷⁶ Arkan attended SBWS and RSK government meetings, the latter as Hadžić's "special consultant".⁷⁷ Hadžić provided Arkan with headquarters, financed his operations and created an environment in which Arkan and his Tigers could commit crimes with impunity.⁷⁸

16. Hadžić met regularly with Babić, Martić and other members of the Croatian Serb political leadership.⁷⁹ Hadžić travelled to the Knin area, where Babić and Martić were based and where RSK parliamentary sessions were held.⁸⁰ Martić was Minister of the Interior in Hadžić's RSK government.⁸¹ Through their contacts with the Serbian leadership, Hadžić and Martić organised the financial and logistical support from Belgrade for units on the ground.⁸²

17. Hadžić, Babić and Martić also co-ordinated with the Bosnian Serb political and military leadership in furtherance of their common interests to create ethnic-Serb entities and unite Serbs in a single state.⁸³

18. Hadžić worked together with Šešelj and his volunteers, including during the Serb takeover of Vukovar and the expulsion of its non-Serb population.⁸⁴

19. Hadžić was in regular contact with JNA representatives, including members of the JNA NS Corps Command, to co-ordinate the achievement of the common criminal purpose. From Summer 1991, Hadžić attended regular meetings at which operations to "liberate" Serb territories were planned and discussed. For example, in mid-July 1991, Hadžić met with Martić, TO commanders, JNA NS Corps representatives and local officials in Borovo Selo. Martić informed those present about the "liberation" of villages in Knin and the expulsion of Croatian police officers.⁸⁵ Later in July 1991, Hadžić met Vojvodina TO Commander General Mandarić⁸⁶ and others at the Novi Sad JNA barracks to discuss, among other things, the planned takeover of targeted territories in SBWS.⁸⁷ Thereafter, during the summer and fall of 1991, Hadžić met NS Corps Commander

Major-General Mladen Bratić,⁸⁸ his deputy General Andrija Biorčević, Stojičić, Arkan and other TO and JNA members to discuss upcoming operations.⁸⁹

20. The events at Vukovar exemplified the level of co-ordination of JCE members in furtherance of the common criminal purpose. In late-September 1991, Hadžić, JNA representatives, TO commanders and MUP/SDB Serbia representatives met to discuss the need to liberate Vukovar as soon as possible.⁹⁰ A few days before Vukovar's fall, Hadžić met with JNA officers, including Adžić, Mile Mrkšić and Veselin Šljivančanin, at the JNA Guards Brigade command post outside Vukovar to discuss the Vukovar offensive. Stojičić, Simatović and Kertes were also present.⁹¹ On 20 November 1991, in the immediate aftermath of Vukovar's fall, Hadžić chaired a meeting at Vukovar's Velepromet facility between JNA and SAO SBWS representatives to discuss who would take custody of those captured in and around Vukovar.⁹² After the fall of Vukovar, Hadžić also attended a celebratory meeting, at which Adžić, Stanišić, Simatović, Bogdanović, Stojičić, Kertes, Šešelj, Arkan, Mrkšić and other JNA and MUP Serbia representatives were present.⁹³

E. The implementation of the common criminal purpose

21. Using the institutions they headed, Hadžić and his co-perpetrators joined together in the pursuit of forcibly creating mono-ethnic, Serb territories in Croatia.⁹⁴ This required the removal of substantial numbers of Croats and other non-Serbs from the areas claimed by Hadžić and the Croatian Serb leadership.

22. Beginning in the summer of 1991, in furtherance of the common criminal purpose, Hadžić and his co-perpetrators used Serb Forces to carry out a campaign to drive non-Serbs from these territories. This campaign, which continued throughout 1992 and 1993 under Hadžić's RSK Presidency, was assisted by the creation of autonomous regions and parallel political, police and military structures. These structures operated with financial and military support from Serbia and the (S)FRY and were supplemented with MUP/SDB Serbia and Serbian TO units. To consolidate their control over the targeted territories, JCE members also transformed the JNA into a Serb fighting force. With their leaders' urging, thousands of Serbian volunteers joined the JNA and other Serb Forces in SBWS. Discriminatory policies were enacted to further the common criminal purpose by ensuring that expelled non-Serbs did not return.

1. Pattern of crimes

23. Under the direction of Hadžić and his co-perpetrators, Serb Forces captured Serb-claimed territories in SBWS and drove out non-Serbs.

24. As noted above,⁹⁵ in July 1991, Hadžić met General Mandarić and others at the Novi Sad JNA barracks. They discussed the supply of weapons and the need to “liberate Dalj” and link Serb-controlled villages in SBWS with Serbia, identifying the area planned to come under Serb control. They agreed this should be done as soon as possible and planned the pattern the operations would follow: the TO would attack and the JNA would provide support.⁹⁶ From August 1991, TO Commander Stojičić met practically every evening with the NS Corps to co-ordinate joint actions.⁹⁷

25. This plan was initiated with the attacks against Dalj and Erdut on 1 August 1991.⁹⁸ Thereafter, Serb Forces conquered the neighbouring villages of Aljmaš and Sarvaš.⁹⁹ By the end of August 1991, Serb Forces surrounded the city of Vukovar.¹⁰⁰ Attacks grew in intensity against Vukovar city and its immediate environs until 18 November 1991, when the city finally fell.¹⁰¹ Beginning in September 1991, in an effort to link SBWS and Serbia, Serb Forces captured other predominantly Croat towns and villages in the municipality of Vukovar, including Sotin, Tovarnik, Lovas, Bapska, Šarengrad, Ilok and Opatovac.¹⁰² On or around 20 November 1991, Serb Forces captured the Croat villages of Laslovo and Ernestinovo situated to the northwest of Vukovar.¹⁰³

26. Some takeovers were secured by devastating attacks aimed at compelling non-Serbs to flee.¹⁰⁴ A corridor was left open during these attacks through which surviving non-Serbs were encouraged to leave.¹⁰⁵ In other cases, JNA threats to destroy a town or village were sufficient for non-Serb residents to flee *en masse*.¹⁰⁶ As a result, many non-Serbs were internally displaced.

27. The crimes committed during and after takeovers of towns and villages followed a pattern which demonstrates the organisation, preparation and planning which preceded them. Typically, after shelling by the JNA, other Serb Forces expelled non-Serb residents from their homes, and looted and destroyed some non-Serb homes and claimed others as their own.¹⁰⁷ By 17 October 1991, the devastation wrought by Serb Forces in SBWS compelled roughly 11,000 people to flee

Ilok for Croat-controlled territory, rather than suffer the consequences of a Serb takeover.¹⁰⁸ In some instances, Serb Forces also rounded up non-Serbs and expelled them from SBWS.¹⁰⁹

28. The lives of non-Serbs who remained in their towns and villages in the targeted areas were intentionally made miserable by restrictive and discriminatory measures.¹¹⁰ Non-Serbs were mistreated and in some cases sexually assaulted.¹¹¹ Many non-Serbs were ultimately expelled, but before doing so were forced to sign over their property to the local authorities. Non-Serbs' homes were then occupied by Serbs.¹¹² In late-October or early-November 1991, Hadžić and Stanišić arranged for 4,000-5,000 Serbs to be settled in the vacated houses of non-Serbs in Ilok.¹¹³

29. Serb Forces arrested and detained thousands of non-Serbs in detention facilities throughout SBWS characterised by overcrowding, forced labour, brutal beatings, torture and sexual assaults.¹¹⁴ For example, in Erdut, the seat of Hadžić's SBWS government, Arkan ran a make-shift prison at the TO training centre where non-Serbs were brutally mistreated and often murdered.¹¹⁵ The Lovas minefield killings in which Croat detainees were forced to walk through a mined clover field,¹¹⁶ also demonstrates the brutal treatment to which non-Serbs were subjected. The bodies of many prisoners detained in SBWS were dumped in mass graves¹¹⁷ and the Danube River. [REDACTED].¹¹⁸

30. The JCE's criminal objective was particularly evident in the campaign against the non-Serb population of Vukovar, a city which Hadžić and the SBWS leadership claimed as their rightful capital.¹¹⁹ In late-September 1991, as Serb Forces besieged Vukovar, Hadžić stated that Baranja was liberated, Vukovar was still blocked, and that they expected denouement shortly.¹²⁰ On 2 October 1991, Hadžić stated:

The fight for Vukovar continues, our units control almost 50% of the city. We have secure positions and are slowing advancing. That also includes in the past two days actions of cleansing Ustasha villages.¹²¹

Once the city fell to Serb Forces on 18 November 1991, Hadžić and other JCE members ensured that it was cleansed of non-Serbs. Serb Forces killed at least 200 non-Serbs in and around Ovčara between 20 and 21 November 1991.¹²² Non-Serbs were also killed at the Velepromet facility in Vukovar beginning on 19 November 1991.¹²³ In addition to these killings, thousands of non-Serbs were forcibly expelled. Many were transferred to detention facilities in Dalj on or about 20 November 1991, where they were beaten and at least 35 were murdered.¹²⁴ The goal of removing non-Serbs from SBWS was also served by transferring thousands of non-Serbs, including women, children and elderly, to detention facilities in Serbia, where they suffered severe mistreatment, including sexual assaults.¹²⁵ Many others were sent directly to Croat-held territory.¹²⁶

31. As planned, the territory discussed at the July Novi Sad barracks meeting was under Serb control by December 1991.¹²⁷ By this time, JCE members using Serb Forces had also succeeded in forcibly removing or killing¹²⁸ a large proportion of non-Serbs in SBWS.

32. In 1992 and 1993, JCE members continued to use Serb Forces to commit crimes against non-Serbs throughout the RSK.¹²⁹ By the end of December 1993, hundreds of thousands of non-

Serbs had been expelled from RSK-controlled territory.¹³⁰ Areas formerly populated by non-Serbs were resettled by Serbs.¹³¹

2. The establishment of SAO SBWS

33. On 17 February 1990,¹³² Croatian Serbs established their own political party, the Serbian Democratic Party (“SDS”), with a platform foreshadowing the partition of territory along ethnic lines.¹³³ In May 1990, elections were held in Croatia and the Croatian Democratic Union (“HDZ”) led by Franjo Tuđman came to power.¹³⁴ Ethnic tensions in Eastern Slavonia intensified.¹³⁵

34. The SDS leadership of Eastern Slavonia, led by Hadžić, set up a separate SDS branch in SBWS in June 1990.¹³⁶ On 7 January 1991, Hadžić attended a secret meeting in Šidski Banovci,¹³⁷ at which the Serbian National Council (“SNC”) for SBWS was formed.¹³⁸ The SNC aimed to establish a Serb-dominated territory in the SBWS. In February 1991, the SNC proclaimed that Serbs in Croatia were a sovereign people with a right to autonomy.¹³⁹ On 17 March 1991, Hadžić was elected SNC President.¹⁴⁰

35. Hadžić gained popularity among Croatian Serbs after his arrest by the Croatian MUP on 31 March 1991 at Plitvice National Park, during a clash between these forces and police forces of the self-declared SAO Krajina.¹⁴¹ On 2 May 1991, local Serbs and Šešelj’s Men¹⁴² clashed with the Croatian MUP at Borovo Selo near Vukovar. As a result of this clash, Croatian MUP members were killed.¹⁴³ Following this incident, the situation in Eastern Slavonia deteriorated further.¹⁴⁴

36. In May 1991, Hadžić held meetings with Milošević and others in Novi Sad and Belgrade. After one of these meetings, Hadžić informed SBWS representatives that he had approval from Belgrade to form and head a government.¹⁴⁵ On 25 and 26 June 1991, the SBWS Great National Assembly was formed in Bačka Palanka, Serbia,¹⁴⁶ and decided to form the SAO SBWS and to

secede from Croatia.¹⁴⁷ Hadžić was elected President-designate and on 25 September 1991 elected SAO SBWS President.¹⁴⁸

37. The SFRY Presidency publicly supported the SAO SBWS government.¹⁴⁹ On 4 August 1991, the SNC wrote to the SFRY Presidency affirming the SAO SBWS declaration of autonomy and stating that: “All intentions of Ustasha’s ideology are clear to the Serbian people from [SBWS] [...] it is clear to them that there is no joint coexistence with Croats under the Croatian jurisdiction.”¹⁵⁰ Newly-enacted SAO SBWS legislation made the SFRY constitution applicable on SBWS territory and provided that, pending the enactment of SAO SBWS legislation, Republic of Serbia legislation was to be applied on SBWS territory.¹⁵¹

38. After Dalj fell to Serb Forces in August 1991, Hadžić established the SAO SBWS government there¹⁵² and later moved it to Erdut.¹⁵³

39. Hadžić appointed SAO SBWS government ministers who worked towards the realisation of the common criminal purpose. Some of Hadžić’s appointees were from outside SBWS¹⁵⁴ and were appointed to maintain the necessary links to Serbia.¹⁵⁵ For example, on 25 September 1991, Hadžić appointed SDB Serbia operative Ilija Kojić as SAO SBWS Defence Minister.¹⁵⁶ Kojić—who supplied arms provided by Stanišić¹⁵⁷—continued to be employed by MUP Serbia while serving as SBWS Defence Minister.¹⁵⁸ Hadžić also established a SAO SBWS office in Belgrade.¹⁵⁹

3. The creation of separate Serb police and military structures in SBWS

40. With Belgrade’s support, the SAO SBWS leadership intensified its organisational efforts to seize power by forming separate Serb police and military structures. In areas where local Serbs had a majority or a significant minority, they took over existing police and TO structures or established parallel structures.¹⁶⁰ Serbia financed and equipped these units. Hadžić established the SAO SBWS police force and facilitated its financing and the provision of material through MUP Serbia.¹⁶¹

Hadžić had command over the SAO SBWS police and exercised his authority to appoint and dismiss members of the police. He also had *de jure* authority over the SAO SBWS TO.¹⁶²

41. Following the events of 2 May 1991 in Borovo Selo,¹⁶³ Hadžić invited all Serbs who were formerly Croatian MUP members to join the SBWS police.¹⁶⁴ In mid-July 1991 in Borovo Selo, Hadžić formed the SBWS police and appointed the Chief of Police. Ilija Kojić and SDB Serbia operative Radovan Kostić attended the meeting, at which the organisation, payment and equipping of the police force were discussed.¹⁶⁵ Bogdanović and Stanišić provided weapons, vehicles and other equipment to the police force through Kojić and Kostić pursuant to an agreement with Hadžić.¹⁶⁶

42. In early August 1991, local police units were also formed under Hadžić's authority in Dalj and Erdut.¹⁶⁷ These units participated in the crimes charged.¹⁶⁸

43. Stojičić arrived in Dalj after its takeover to organise local TO and police units. He convened meetings with police and TO commanders in the region, where he introduced himself as being from MUP Serbia and stated that, henceforth, he would command local units.¹⁶⁹ During the summer and autumn of 1991, local TO units¹⁷⁰ participated in joint actions with the JNA,¹⁷¹ committing many of the crimes charged.¹⁷²

44. The SAO SBWS armed forces were heavily dependent on financial and material support from Serbia.¹⁷³ From April 1991, SDB Serbia co-ordinated the weapons supply and transport from the Bubanj Potok JNA barracks, outside Belgrade, to the Borovo Selo TO.¹⁷⁴ Kertes and Kostić oversaw the arming and financing of SAO SBWS units.¹⁷⁵

45. On 21 September 1991, Hadžić issued a decision regarding the opening of a transfer account for the SAO SBWS.¹⁷⁶ The account opened in Hadžić's name¹⁷⁷ was essential for the SAO SBWS to receive (S)FRY and Serbian financial assistance.¹⁷⁸

46. The SBWS police was supplemented with MUP Serbia personnel. From the summer of 1991, MUP Serbia, in co-operation with the JNA, trained and equipped MUP Serbia units at the Bubanj Potok barracks for deployment to SBWS, where they integrated into local police units.¹⁷⁹ MUP Serbia provided its units with uniforms, weapons, equipment, SAO SBWS insignia and salaries.¹⁸⁰

47. Sometime after May 1991, Hadžić formed the Serbian National Security ("SNB"),¹⁸¹ a unit which operated under his personal control.¹⁸² Hadžić appointed Stevo Bogić *a.k.a.* Jajo, a close family friend,¹⁸³ as SNB Commander¹⁸⁴ and a Minister without Portfolio in Hadžić's government.¹⁸⁵ Bogić reported directly to Hadžić.¹⁸⁶ The SNB was financed by the SAO SBWS government.¹⁸⁷ Bogić's office, Hadžić's office and Arkan's training centre were in the same compound in Erdut.¹⁸⁸ Bogić met daily with Hadžić and later conveyed the instructions received to SNB members.¹⁸⁹

48. Envisaged as a local equivalent of SDB Serbia,¹⁹⁰ the SNB's main task was to provide security for Hadžić and the SAO SBWS government.¹⁹¹ SNB members were directly involved in the crimes charged.¹⁹²

4. The deployment of MUP/SDB-sponsored units and personnel to SBWS¹⁹³

49. Stanišić sent Arkan to the Dalj region soon after the Serb takeover.¹⁹⁴ Arkan and his

Tigers¹⁹⁵ were based at the Erdut TO training centre.¹⁹⁶ Hadžić appointed Arkan as the commander of the Erdut training centre and ensured that it was financed through the SAO SBWS and RSK governments.¹⁹⁷ Pursuant to Hadžić's order, Arkan's training centre was financed by DP Dalj, a large state-owned agricultural complex appropriated by the SAO SBWS government.¹⁹⁸ DP Dalj paid the training centre's invoices from 1991 to 1993¹⁹⁹ and in turn invoiced these expenses to the SAO SBWS Ministry of Defence ("MoD").²⁰⁰

50. SDB Serbia and the Serbian MoD supplied Arkan with weaponry and ammunition.²⁰¹ Arkan in turn provided logistical support and training to different units at the Erdut training centre.²⁰² Arkan's Tigers co-operated closely with Hadžić's SNB.²⁰³ Members of Arkan's Tigers visited SNB commander Bogić's office regularly.²⁰⁴

51. During the summer and autumn of 1991, Arkan's Tigers participated in "mopping up" operations with JNA units.²⁰⁵ JNA General Andrija Biorčević described the role of Arkan's unit in joint actions with the JNA:

That was the greatest contribution of ARKAN's volunteers [...] We surround a village, they enter it, kill those who refuse to surrender and we go on.²⁰⁶

52. Arkan and his Tigers were among the most brutal perpetrators of crimes in SBWS.²⁰⁷ Arkan openly advocated the commission of crimes against Croats and other non-Serbs.²⁰⁸ On numerous occasions, he said that his unit would take no "Ustasha" prisoners in combat.²⁰⁹ In 1992, Arkan's Tigers co-operated with and supported the RSK MUP.²¹⁰

53. Under Stanišić's authority, Simatović established a special operations unit, initially the Special Purpose Unit ("JPN"), later formalized as Anti-Terrorist Unit ("JATD") and eventually

Special Operations Unit (“JSO”).²¹¹ These units, which were also known as “Frenki’s men”²¹² or “Red Berets”,²¹³ operated in eastern Croatia,²¹⁴ committing some of the crimes charged.²¹⁵

54. SDB Serbia established a training camp for police forces at Golubić near Knin²¹⁶ run by Simatović.²¹⁷ The SDB sent Dragan Vasiljković *a.k.a.* Captain Dragan to the region,²¹⁸ to train special-purpose units, including Frenki’s Men²¹⁹ and Martić’s police,²²⁰ and to work with the local TO.²²¹

55. SDB Serbia also financed and organised the Scorpions.²²² This unit was originally created to secure the oil fields in Đeletovci, but was later active in other parts of SBWS.²²³

5. The incorporation of volunteers from Serbia²²⁴

56. Serb Forces in SBWS were supplemented with volunteers from Serbia called on by Hadžić²²⁵ and other JCE members. These volunteers perpetrated some of the crimes charged.

57. The Serbian MoD and the SSNO were heavily involved in the organisation, training, and arming of volunteers for deployment to Croatia.²²⁶ From August to November/December 1991 there were approximately 3,000 to 4,000 volunteers from Serbia serving in the SAO SBWS TO.²²⁷ The JNA also incorporated volunteers from Serbia during operations in Croatia.²²⁸ Arkan’s Erdut training centre served as a collection centre from which they were assigned to different units in SBWS.²²⁹

58. In 1991 several nationalist political parties in Serbia formed volunteer units and dispatched them to Croatia.²³⁰ Vojislav Šešelj organised his own volunteers, commonly referred to as

“Chetniks” or Šešelj’s Men.²³¹ They were active in SBWS from May 1991 onwards,²³² participated in joint actions with Arkan’s Tigers²³³ and were involved in crimes.²³⁴

59. Volunteers from other groups were also active in SBWS. These included the White Eagles from Mirko Jović’s Serb National Renewal Movement (“SNO”),²³⁵ who were present in areas including Borovo Selo,²³⁶ Western Slavonia²³⁷ and Vukovar.²³⁸ The Dušan Silni detachment, which committed crimes in SBWS, including the notorious Lovas minefield massacre,²³⁹ was affiliated with the SNO.²⁴⁰

6. The intervention of the JNA to protect Serb interests

60. To consolidate Serb control of SBWS, JCE members needed JNA intervention.

61. In 1991, the JNA abandoned its constitutional mission as the SFRY Army²⁴¹ and openly declared itself to be protecting Serb interests in Croatia.²⁴² The JNA leadership, including Generals Kadijević and Adžić, and several political leaders, led by Milošević, redefined the JNA’s task as “protecting and defending the Serb people outside of Serbia and assembling the JNA within the boundaries of the future Yugoslavia”.²⁴³

62. From May 1991, Milošević, Borisav Jović (Serbia’s representative in the SFRY Presidency) and General Kadijević met frequently to discuss the JNA’s role in protecting Serbs.²⁴⁴ General Kadijević described the JNA’s task as being, among others, to “create and defend the new Yugoslav state of those Yugoslav nations that desire to be part of it, meaning in this phase the Serb and Montenegrin nations.”²⁴⁵

63. In Croatia, the JNA’s goal became “to protect the Serb people in Croatia in such a way that all regions with a majority Serb population would be completely freed from the presence of the

Croatian army and the Croatian authorities.”²⁴⁶

64. The JNA stopped answering to the SFRY President as Commander-in-Chief and instead took direction from the Serbian leadership, in particular from Milošević. On 5 July 1991, Milošević and Jović instructed General Kadijević to concentrate the JNA’s main forces along an axis from Karlovac to Plitvice in the west, from Baranja, Osijek, and Vinkovci (Croatia) to the Sava in the east, and along the Neretva in the south (BiH).²⁴⁷ After this repositioning, the JNA covered all the Serb-populated areas,²⁴⁸ and the violence quickly escalated.²⁴⁹ [REDACTED]²⁵⁰

65. Beginning in August 1991, JNA units,²⁵¹ together with other Serb Forces, attacked villages, hamlets and towns in SBWS to forcibly expel Croats and other non-Serbs.²⁵² To achieve this aim, Serb Forces were deployed in a co-ordinated fashion under JNA operational control.²⁵³ In addition to local TO units, several Serbian TO units²⁵⁴ were deployed to SBWS under JNA command and participated in joint actions.²⁵⁵

66. After the fall of Vukovar, General Kadijević awarded commendations to JNA Commanders Života Panić,²⁵⁶ Mrkšić and Biorčević for their victory.²⁵⁷ In December 1991, General Kadijević justified JNA intervention by referring to the need to stop a “repeat of the genocide over the Serbian nation in Croatia.”²⁵⁸ At a SFRY Presidency meeting in December 1991, Hadžić advocated that the JNA remain in SBWS, describing it as “the main factor of stability and security”.²⁵⁹

7. The SAO Krajina and SAO Western Slavonia

67. As in SBWS, separate Serb autonomous regions were formed in Krajina and Western Slavonia.

68. On 21 December 1990, the SAO Krajina was proclaimed under Babić's leadership.²⁶⁰ Several months later, in April 1991, the SAO Krajina Executive Council joined the SAO Krajina to Serbia and applied Serbia's Constitution and laws,²⁶¹ thus separating the SAO from Croatia. Babić and Martić publicly advocated that SAO Krajina belonged with Serbia.²⁶²

69. From January 1991, local Serb authorities in SAO Krajina established their own police structures²⁶³ and TO units.²⁶⁴ These structures relied fully on support from Serbia.²⁶⁵

70. Serb Forces carried out a violent persecutory campaign in SAO Krajina to drive out non-Serbs.²⁶⁶

71. SAO Western Slavonia was established on 12 August 1991 and SDS member Veljko Džakula was elected President.²⁶⁷

8. The RSK and the Vance Plan

72. On 23 November 1991 in Geneva, Tudman, Milošević and Kadijević agreed on a ceasefire under the auspices of UN Special Envoy Cyrus Vance,²⁶⁸ which was followed by the signing of an agreement on 2 January 1992 implementing the ceasefire ("Vance Plan").²⁶⁹ The Vance Plan made provision for the deployment of a UN Protection Force ("UNPROFOR") in three UN Protected Areas ("UNPAs") (Krajina, Western Slavonia and SWBS),²⁷⁰ demilitarisation, the JNA's withdrawal and the eventual return of refugees and IDPs.²⁷¹

73. Despite signing the Vance Plan, the Croatian Serb leadership—with Milošević's support—simultaneously pursued policies and practices intended to consolidate Serb control of territories in Croatia. On 19 December 1991, the SAO Krajina leadership proclaimed the RSK with Babić as President, and adopted the RSK Constitution.²⁷² Following a disagreement between Milošević and Babić over the Vance Plan, the RSK Assembly removed Babić from office.²⁷³ On 26 February

1992, the SAO Western Slavonia and SAO SBWS joined the RSK,²⁷⁴ and Hadžić was appointed RSK President.²⁷⁵ Martić was elected RSK Minister of the Interior.²⁷⁶

74. Hadžić declared that the adoption of the RSK Constitution was “a significant step towards the union of the entire Serbian nation, that is, towards protection of the Serbian interests [...].”²⁷⁷ He described the RSK as “a bastion of defence of Serbdom”²⁷⁸ and condemned Serbs who were against unification of the RSK with Serbia as “Ustashas”.²⁷⁹

75. Throughout 1992 and 1993, the RSK leadership, including Hadžić, requested²⁸⁰ and received²⁸¹ financial, logistical and military support from Serbia on numerous occasions, including directly from Milošević.

76. With the proclamation of the RSK, General Adžić, then acting SSNO Head, ordered the formation of the RSK TO,²⁸² comprising local TO units from the SAOs.²⁸³ Under the RSK Constitution, the RSK TO was subordinated directly to Hadžić.²⁸⁴ In February 1992, Hadžić met with the then JNA 1st MD Commander Panić, General Mandarić, Stanišić and Stojičić to appoint new RSK TO Commanders.²⁸⁵

77. In contravention of the Vance Plan, the Serbian military²⁸⁶ and police organs²⁸⁷ organised and equipped the RSK TO. JNA units ostensibly withdrawing from Croatia gave their military equipment to the RSK TO units.²⁸⁸ Some JNA personnel continued to serve in the RSK TO.²⁸⁹ The RSK police was also financed, trained and equipped by Serbia,²⁹⁰ including by MUP Serbia.²⁹¹

78. Once UNPROFOR was deployed to Croatia in May 1992,²⁹² many RSK TO units were

transformed into Special Police Units (“PJMs”).²⁹³ Instead of withdrawing or demobilising, JNA and RSK TO commanding officers²⁹⁴ and other personnel,²⁹⁵ and their equipment,²⁹⁶ were transferred to the newly-established PJMs.²⁹⁷ Former JNA and TO vehicles were repainted as police vehicles.²⁹⁸

79. In further violation of the Vance Plan, on 18 May 1992, Hadžić adopted a decree establishing the Serbian Army of the RSK (“SVK”).²⁹⁹ The SVK relied heavily on financial, logistical and operational support from the VJ and the Serb political leadership.³⁰⁰ Hadžić and Martić obtained and organised this support through their contacts with Milošević and other high-level Serbian officials.³⁰¹

80. Arkan’s Tigers fought in Knin from January to March 1993, as an integral part of the SVK.³⁰² The Super Tigers, formed in March 1993, were formally subordinated to the SVK and co-ordinated with SDB Serbia.³⁰³

81. These units continued to commit crimes against non-Serbs in 1992 and 1993 pursuant to the common criminal plan.³⁰⁴

9. The implementation of discriminatory policies against non-Serbs to ensure their removal and non-return

82. Hadžić’s SAO SBWS and RSK governments formulated and implemented discriminatory policies intended to advance the common criminal purpose.

83. Under SAO SBWS constitutional law, the SBWS government—comprised of the President, vice-presidents and ministers—determined the region’s policy and enforced its laws.³⁰⁵ In order to do so, the government proposed and passed legislation, and adopted decrees, decisions and other

acts.³⁰⁶ As President, Hadžić oversaw the development and implementation of these laws and policies.

84. On 25 September 1991, the SAO SBWS Assembly passed a law guaranteeing the inviolability of private property for everyone other than “those citizens of the Republic of Croatia and Yugoslavia whose property is seized ... due to their subversive activities in the period of fighting on the territory of the Serb region.”³⁰⁷ Such legislation provided a pretext to seize the property of non-Serbs.

85. In October 1991, Hadžić’s government passed legislation permitting the appropriation of Croatian assets and “abandoned” private property by the SAO SBWS government.³⁰⁸ This legislation enabled the appropriation of assets used to finance Arkan’s Tigers.³⁰⁹

86. Other discriminatory measures included an SAO SBWS government decision to ban the return to Baranja of all persons who had failed to return by 25 September 1991,³¹⁰ a clear attempt to prevent the return of the non-Serbs who had been expelled by that date.

87. The discriminatory policies of the SAO SWBS government were mirrored in RSK governmental policies. Led by Hadžić, the RSK authorities had a clear policy to populate the region with Serbs, while ensuring the expulsion of non-Serbs.³¹¹ Discriminatory RSK legislation enacted under Hadžić’s authority included:

- Legislation permitting the resettlement of only those people who had a clean war record and had not collaborated with the “enemy”;³¹²
- Legislation authorising the return of WWII refugees other than those who fought for Croatia and the Axis Powers,³¹³ a brazen and provocative move given the ongoing ethnic cleansing of non-Serbs from the territory;
- Legislation granting RSK citizenship to persons of Serb nationality born in Croatia and residing outside the RSK;³¹⁴ and
- Legislation banning all Croatian citizens from entering the RSK.³¹⁵

Throughout his tenure as RSK President, Hadžić continued to enact and implement legislation which ensured that the expelled non-Serbs would not return.

III. HADŽIĆ'S INDIVIDUAL CRIMINAL RESPONSIBILITY UNDER ARTICLES 7(1) AND 7(3) OF THE STATUTE

88. Hadžić bears individual criminal responsibility under Article 7(1) not only through his participation in the JCE described above, but also for planning, ordering, instigating and aiding and abetting the charged crimes. He is also liable under Article 7(3) for his failure to prevent and punish the crimes committed by his subordinates.

A. Hadžić's responsibility through his participation in the JCE

1. Introduction

89. Hadžić is liable under Article 7(1) for committing the charged crimes as a member of the JCE described above. These crimes were committed pursuant to the common criminal purpose, which Hadžić shared.³¹⁶

90. Alternatively, should any of the crimes in Counts 1 to 9 and 12 to 14 be found to fall outside the original common criminal purpose, the Trial Chamber may find that the JCE evolved over time so as to include these crimes.³¹⁷ Further, any crimes not encompassed by the common criminal purpose at the relevant time were natural and foreseeable consequences of its execution. Hadžić willingly took that risk and decided to participate in the enterprise.³¹⁸

(a) Hadžić significantly contributed to the implementation of the common criminal purpose

91. Through his acts and omissions, both individually and cumulatively, Hadžić significantly contributed to the implementation of the common criminal purpose in several ways, including the following:

92. As discussed above, Hadžić:

- Established and led government bodies which implemented and facilitated the common criminal purpose;³¹⁹
- Formulated and implemented discriminatory policies intended to advance the common criminal purpose,³²⁰ and
- Provided financial, material and logistical assistance to Serb Forces and facilitated their operations in furtherance of the common criminal purpose.³²¹

93. In addition, as discussed below, Hadžić:

- Actively participated in crimes against non-Serbs;³²²
- Encouraged crimes against non-Serbs by creating an environment of impunity;³²³ and
- Failed to uphold his legal duties to protect the non-Serb population in the area under his authority.³²⁴

(i) Hadžić actively participated in crimes against non-Serbs

94. Hadžić directly participated in and facilitated crimes against non-Serbs, including in the following ways:

- Following the takeover of Dalj, members of the local TO, JNA and police arrested non-Serbs from surrounding villages and detained them at different facilities in Dalj. Hadžić's government ordered that these people be detained.³²⁵
- In early September 1991, Hadžić ordered the unlawful detention of 25-30 Croats in Dalj, describing them as "Ustashas from Baranja". The Dalj police commander complained directly to Hadžić regarding their unlawful detention. In the heated argument that ensued, Hadžić retorted that he was the Prime Minister and could order anything to be done.³²⁶

- On 21 September 1991, Hadžić facilitated the murder of 11 of the detainees at the Dalj police headquarters by releasing them into Arkan's custody.³²⁷
- At the meeting Hadžić chaired on 20 November 1991 at Vukovar's Velepromet facility, attended by JNA and SAO SBWS representatives, Hadžić insisted that the JNA transfer those suspected of participating in military operations to SAO SBWS authorities.³²⁸ Hadžić advocated this despite the well-known criminality of SBWS TO units:³²⁹ [REDACTED].³³⁰ Shortly after the Velopromet meeting, at least 200 non-Serbs were taken from the JNA barracks to Ovčara farm and killed by Serb Forces, including local TO members and Šešelj's Men.³³¹ Non-Serbs from the Vukovar area were also transferred to detention facilities in Dalj, where at least 35 were killed by Serb Forces, including the local TO.³³²
- Hundreds of non-Serb civilians from the Vukovar area were transferred to the Sremska Mitrovica prison. Hadžić visited the prison and interrogated, threatened and was involved in beating detainees.³³³
- Hadžić permitted non-Serbs from the SAO SBWS/RSK to be transferred to detention facilities in Serbia knowing that they would likely be abused there.³³⁴
- Together with others, Hadžić planned and was actively involved in the mass expulsion of non-Serbs from the SAO SBWS/RSK to Croat-controlled territory.³³⁵ For example, Hadžić instructed local police to cooperate with UNPROFOR in escorting roughly 400 non-Serbs from Marinci to Croat-controlled territory on 20 April 1992.³³⁶
- Hadžić contributed to the forcible displacement and deportation by repeatedly and publicly proclaiming that Serbs and Croats could not live together, denigrating Croats and espousing pro-Serb policies.³³⁷ In so doing, he fuelled the persecutory and coercive atmosphere, encouraging non-Serbs to flee.³³⁸

(ii) Hadžić encouraged crimes by creating an environment of impunity

95. Throughout the Indictment period, Hadžić encouraged crimes in furtherance of the criminal purpose by creating an environment of impunity. He openly encouraged Serb Forces to use violence against non-Serbs and deliberately refrained from intervening against the perpetrators of crimes. Given his high-ranking positions within the SBWS/RSK and his well-known association with the Serbian political and military leadership and Arkan, Hadžić’s acquiescence made it clear that there was a policy to remove non-Serbs from Serb-claimed territory.

96. Hadžić also made his own discriminatory views clear. On 20 November 1991, after Vukovar fell, Hadžić gave an interview to Serbian television summarising the meeting he had just chaired with JNA and SAO SBWS representatives at the Velepromet facility. He stated that “the prisoners and Ustashas who have blood on their hands cannot leave the territory of SAO SBWS”, and that he undertook to return those people—“*if they can be called people at all*”—and purportedly to put them on trial.³³⁹

97. From 1991 onwards, Hadžić explicitly supported the creation of a separate Serb state.³⁴⁰ As RSK President, Hadžić maintained this position. In a public address, Hadžić stated:

[T]he leadership will by no means accept any option where [Serb] areas have to remain in the Republic of Croatia. We said “no” a long time ago and our “no” will mean fight if necessary, but we will not allow ourselves to stay in Croatia.³⁴¹

98. At an RSK Assembly session in October 1993, Hadžić stated that:

All of us here know that we are facing an outright war with Croats and that we will win that war with many casualties, [whatever] the number is going to be, and we will solve the Serbian issue, secure the borders of Serbian ethnic space once and for all.³⁴²

99. Even when explicitly informed of crimes, Hadžić failed to denounce them:

- When confronted with the abduction of non-Serb detainees on 21 September 1991 in Dalj—in which he had directly participated³⁴³—he reacted dismissively, making no attempt to justify himself. Some days later, he fired the police commander who had confronted him.³⁴⁴
- When he learned of the execution of a non-Serb family by his own security force, the SNB and Arkan’s Tigers in November 1991 in Erdut,³⁴⁵ Hadžić neither denounced nor punished

the crime. Rather, he warned the SNB to be careful about what was being done and how it was done.³⁴⁶ Hadžić subsequently blocked a 1992 enquiry into the SNB's activities.³⁴⁷

- When confronted by local villagers about the fate of five non-Serbs from Klisa, abducted by Arkan's unit on 11 November 1991,³⁴⁸ Hadžić refused to discuss the issue.³⁴⁹
- When confronted by international community representatives with the crimes being committed against non-Serb civilians in the RSK, Hadžić continually denied that the perpetrators were under his control, or complained about crimes committed against Serb civilians.³⁵⁰ Rather than expressing an interest in putting an end to the crimes against non-Serbs, he defended them as a consequence of Serb self-defence or Serb self-determination.³⁵¹
- Despite the massacre in the Lovas minefield on 18 October 1991³⁵² being widely known and documented,³⁵³ Hadžić provided political protection for the perpetrators.³⁵⁴ Although the JNA alerted the SAO SBWS MUP to the crime, the latter did not investigate it.³⁵⁵

100. Despite his knowledge that crimes were occurring,³⁵⁶ Hadžić took no action to prevent or punish them.³⁵⁷ Hadžić's refusal to take action to stop crimes against non-Serbs demonstrates that he condoned, if not orchestrated, such criminal activity.³⁵⁸

101. This environment of impunity continued to permeate the RSK in 1992 and 1993. Widespread, ethnically-motivated crimes committed against non-Serb civilians formed the background against which the peace negotiations were taking place. They were a regular topic in meetings between UNPROFOR representatives and Hadžić and other Serb leaders.³⁵⁹ When international representatives raised the ethnic cleansing of non-Serbs with the local police, the local police refused to investigate, advising the representatives to speak to Hadžić. Hadžić refused to take

responsibility for addressing these crimes, referring instead to the centuries of oppression of Serbs, and claimed that people were leaving their homes freely.³⁶⁰

(iii) **Hadžić failed to uphold his legal duties to ensure respect for the law and protection of non-Serbs**

102. Hadžić failed to discharge his legal duties arising from his position.³⁶¹ As political leader of the SAO SBWS/RSK, Hadžić had a duty to protect the safety of the civilian population that inhabited the territories under his authority, regardless of their ethnicity. This duty extended to detainees who were inhabitants of the SAO SBWS/RSK held in facilities in Croatia and Serbia.³⁶²

103. Specifically, with regard to detainees, Hadžić had the duty to ensure:

- The proper determination of the detainees' legal status within a reasonable time,³⁶³ or to ensure their release;³⁶⁴
- The protection of detainees while in his custody or the custody of the detaining power;³⁶⁵ and
- That detainees were not transferred from his custody or the custody of the detaining power unless there was a reasonable belief that they would not be harmed.³⁶⁶

104. Hadžić's duty to inhabitants of the territories subject to his authority included his duty to ensure:

- That all inhabitants enjoyed respect for their human rights³⁶⁷ and
- The adequate care of "persons under the control of [his] subordinates."³⁶⁸

105. While both the SAO SBWS and RSK constitutions enshrined the rights of all citizens of the territory,³⁶⁹ in reality non-Serbs were systematically persecuted.³⁷⁰ Despite the duties enumerated

above and his executive authority over the police and military,³⁷¹ Hadžić took no actions to protect non-Serbs. To the contrary, through the acts and omissions discussed above,³⁷² he endangered those he had the duty to protect.

2. Hadžić shared the JCE intent

106. Hadžić shared the intent to carry out the common criminal purpose and thus intended that the crimes falling within the scope of the JCE occur.³⁷³

107. As discussed above, Hadžić actively participated in crimes against non-Serbs. In addition, throughout his leadership, Serb Forces controlled or assisted by him or other JCE members perpetrated numerous crimes against non-Serbs in order to forcefully remove them from the territory under his authority. Although he had the power to do so, Hadžić deliberately refrained from intervening against the perpetrators of crimes. By participating in persecutory acts and by repeatedly failing to use his position to prevent his subordinates from committing crimes or to punish the perpetrators, Hadžić demonstrated his approval of these crimes. Hadžić’s knowledge of and lack of reaction to crimes combined with his continued participation in the JCE is conclusive evidence of his intent.³⁷⁴

108. Should any of the crimes be found to fall outside the JCE’s common criminal purpose, Hadžić is nevertheless liable for them as natural and foreseeable consequences of the JCE’s implementation. With the awareness that these crimes were a possible consequence of its execution, Hadžić willingly took that risk and participated in the JCE.³⁷⁵

B. Other forms of liability under Article 7(1)³⁷⁶

109. Hadžić planned the crimes described in the Indictment. He developed the strategy encompassing their occurrence and was involved in meetings in which the execution of specific crimes was planned.³⁷⁷ In so doing, he substantially contributed to the crimes.³⁷⁸

110. Hadžić also ordered crimes.³⁷⁹ He was in a high position of authority—by his own account he could order anything to be done³⁸⁰—and effectively exercised this authority.³⁸¹ Given the

systematic persecution of non-Serbs in the areas under Hadžić's authority, the only reasonable inference is that he instructed others to commit the charged crimes. Such orders had a direct and substantial effect on the commission of the crimes.³⁸²

111. Hadžić instigated the charged crimes, by prompting others to commit them, including by:

- Ordering the crimes;
- Facilitating their commission;³⁸³
- Creating an environment permissive of criminal behaviour;³⁸⁴ and
- Failing to discharge his legal duties to ensure respect for the law and the protection of the non-Serb population in the territories under his authority.³⁸⁵

These acts and omissions, both individually and cumulatively, substantially contributed to the commission of the crimes.³⁸⁶

112. In relation to his liability for planning, ordering and instigating, Hadžić directly intended the crimes. In the alternative, he was aware of the substantial likelihood that the execution of his plans and orders, and/or the carrying out of the acts which he instigated, would involve or result in the crimes taking place.³⁸⁷

113. Equally, Hadžić aided and abetted the charged crimes. Through both his positive acts and his failure to discharge his legal duties,³⁸⁸ Hadžić provided practical assistance, encouragement and moral support to those committing the crimes.³⁸⁹ Hadžić knew of the probability that the crimes would be committed and that his acts or omissions would contribute to their commission.³⁹⁰

C. Hadžić's Superior Responsibility under Article 7(3)

1. Hadžić's superior-subordinate relationship over Serb Forces in the SAO SBWS/RSK

114. Hadžić was the superior of, and had effective control over, Serb Forces and subordinate Croatian Serb political and governmental personnel in the SAO SBWS and the RSK.

115. As President of the SAO SBWS government, Hadžić had effective control over the SAO SBWS political and governmental personnel, the SAO SBWS police, the TO, the SNB and other Serb Forces operating in the region.³⁹¹ He appointed Bogić as SNB Commander, Stojadin Todić as SBWS TO Staff Commander and Arkan as Commander of the Erdut training centre.³⁹² He dismissed police officers who confronted him for releasing non-Serb detainees into Arkan's custody on 21 September 1991 in Dalj³⁹³ and the SAO SBWS Minister of the Interior.³⁹⁴ This demonstrates his ability to exercise control when he chose to do so.

116. Equally, as RSK President, Hadžić had authority over the RSK civilian police and the police special units, through the Minister of the Interior and the Defence Minister respectively.³⁹⁵ Government ministers were answerable to him³⁹⁶ and he acknowledged his ability to appoint and dismiss members of the RSK government and SVK leadership.³⁹⁷ He had the authority to order the Ministry of the Interior to conduct investigations and make arrests, which he exercised.³⁹⁸

117. During 1992, Hadžić continued to exercise effective control over Arkan's Tigers and other Serb Forces operating in the RSK.³⁹⁹ One international official perceived certain members of these forces to be "Hadžić's Men", as whenever he saw or met Hadžić, he was escorted or surrounded by them.⁴⁰⁰ In General Panić's view, Arkan was led by Hadžić.⁴⁰¹

118. As RSK President, Hadžić was commander-in-chief of the RSK armed forces, including the RSK TO and the SVK.⁴⁰² Hadžić was authorised to:

- Lead the armed forces in peacetime and wartime, order general and partial mobilisation and organise preparations for the RSK's defence;⁴⁰³

- Preside over the RSK Supreme Defence Council, from its establishment in April 1993;⁴⁰⁴
- Appoint and promote military leaders;⁴⁰⁵
- Order the use of the police in wartime, during an imminent threat of war and state of emergency;⁴⁰⁶ and
- Declare a state of war in the RSK, which he did on 22 January 1993.⁴⁰⁷

119. Both as SAO SBWS President and later as RSK President, Hadžić held himself out as a head of state. He met frequently with UNPROFOR and international representatives, and represented the RSK in international negotiations.⁴⁰⁸ Almost every evening he would appear on television and discuss the state of affairs in the RSK.⁴⁰⁹ Hadžić openly asserted his executive authority over the RSK military and police, and never denied his ability to direct and order his subordinate forces.⁴¹⁰ Hadžić also demonstrated his authority over military matters. When, for example, he undertook to do something in negotiations with UNPROFOR, he was able to deliver the promised action.⁴¹¹

2. Hadžić's knowledge of the crimes committed by his subordinates

120. As President of the SAO SBWS and later the RSK, Hadžić was well-informed of all significant activities taking place within the territories under Serb control. His knowledge extended to the campaign of crime, persecution and expulsion directed against the non-Serbs present in these areas. Hadžić knew or had reason to know of the crimes being committed by his subordinates in the SAO SBWS and, in the 1992-1993 period, throughout the RSK. This knowledge is evidenced by factors including the following:

- He was directly involved in crimes committed by his subordinates;⁴¹²

- He was in close personal proximity to the location where crimes took place;⁴¹³
- He was in a position to observe crimes on the ground as these unfolded;
- He was aware of the propensity of his subordinates to engage in violent and criminal behaviour;
- He received notice of crimes through his regular contacts with the Croatian Serb and the (S)FRY and Serbian authorities, with whom he frequently met to discuss the situation in the area under his authority,⁴¹⁴ through representatives of the international community,⁴¹⁵ through UN resolutions⁴¹⁶ and through the media;⁴¹⁷ and
- The sheer scale of the widespread and pervasive crimes against the non-Serb population made such crimes common knowledge.

3. Hadžić's failure to prevent or punish

121. In addition to Hadžić's power to discipline and dismiss his subordinates, he had the ability to initiate criminal proceedings against them for their crimes. Functioning judicial systems existed in the SAO SBWS⁴¹⁸ and the RSK.⁴¹⁹

122. However, those carrying out the crimes associated with ethnic cleansing in the SAO SBWS and the RSK operated in an environment of impunity, as Hadžić refused to take any action to prevent or punish such criminal activity.⁴²⁰

IV. THE CRIMES

A. General Requirements of Article 3 of the Statute

1. Existence of an armed conflict

123. From at least June 1991 until at least the end of December 1993, an armed conflict existed in the territory of Croatia between the Serb Forces, as defined in paragraph 11 of the Indictment,

and the Croatian armed forces, including the Croatian MUP, the Croatian National Guard (“ZNG”) and the Croatian army.⁴²¹

124. From March 1991, Croatian forces launched attacks against JNA barracks and facilities in Croatia, provoking a JNA response.⁴²² Inter-ethnic tensions increased following clashes between Croatian and Serb forces in Pakrac⁴²³ and Plitvice in March 1991⁴²⁴ and in Borovo Selo in May 1991.⁴²⁵ In Spring 1991, units from Serbia, including Šešelj’s Men and Arkan’s Tigers, established themselves in various parts of Eastern Slavonia.⁴²⁶ From June 1991, Serb Forces began attacking towns and villages in SBWS.⁴²⁷

2. Nexus between the armed conflict and the crimes

125. There was a nexus between the armed conflict and the crimes charged under Article 3 of the Statute. The crimes occurred in the context of a war between Serb Forces and Croatian armed forces over the establishment of autonomous, mono-ethnic Serb territories in Croatia. The victims were civilians and persons not taking an active part in the hostilities at the time of the crimes. The perpetrators were aware of the nexus between their acts and the armed conflict.

B. General Requirements of Article 5 of the Statute

126. As required under Article 5 of the Statute, each of the crimes against humanity charged formed part of a widespread and/or systematic attack against a civilian population and the perpetrators were aware of the nexus between their acts and the attack.

1. The attack

127. During the Indictment period, Serb Forces carried out an attack against the Croat and other non-Serb population in large parts of Croatia. The purpose of this attack was to establish separate ethnically-Serb territories within Croatia through criminal means.⁴²⁸

2. The widespread and/or systematic nature of the attack

128. Each of the crimes against humanity charged formed part of a widespread and/or systematic attack directed against a civilian population. Serb Forces attacked predominantly Croat and non-Serb hamlets, villages and towns in the targeted territories of Croatia during the Indictment period. The Croat and other non-Serb population was targeted. The evidence establishes that the Croat and non-Serb population was subjected to widespread killings, expulsions, deportations, arbitrary imprisonments, torture, wanton destruction, plunder and persecutions, resulting in thousands of victims and widespread destruction of their property and religious institutions.

129. The attack on the hamlets, villages and towns throughout the targeted territories in Croatia was conducted systematically. Serb Forces attacked village after village, burnt houses and religious sites, expelled, mistreated and killed non-Serb civilians. Those who survived were arbitrarily detained in inhumane conditions. The repetition of similar criminal conduct during the Indictment period shows that the crimes were the direct result of high-level planning and co-ordination by JCE members.

3. Civilian population

130. The attack was directed against the Croat and non-Serb civilian population. Non-Serb towns, many of which were undefended or could offer no significant resistance, were shelled and attacked indiscriminately, resulting in extensive civilian casualties. Non-Serb civilians, including women, children and elderly villagers, were systematically mistreated, killed and expelled from their villages. The presence within the civilian population of individuals not falling within the definition of civilians does not deprive the population of its civilian character.⁴²⁹ There is no requirement in law that the victims of the underlying crimes be civilians.⁴³⁰

4. Hadžić's acts formed part of the attack and he was aware that his acts formed part of the attack

131. Hadžić planned and implemented the attack on the Croat and non-Serb population and was among the main participants in the JCE. Hadžić was clearly aware that his acts in furtherance of the JCE, by their nature and consequences, formed part of this attack on the civilian population.

5. Discriminatory intent for persecutions

132. The general pattern of crime described above establishes that the crimes charged in the Indictment were carried out with the intent to discriminate on racial, religious and/or political

grounds within the meaning of Article 5(h) of the Statute. Hadžić, together with other JCE members, headed this campaign of persecutions. He had the intent to discriminate against Croats and other non-Serbs because of their racial, political or religious affiliations during the relevant time.

C. The crimes charged

1. Dalj⁴³¹

133. The village of Dalj is located in Osijek Municipality, along the Danube River. In early 1991, Dalj had a mixed population.⁴³²

134. On 1 August 1991 the local TO, together with JNA units, attacked the village of Dalj⁴³³ and the nearby Dalj Planina area.⁴³⁴ The JNA shelled the Dalj police station, killing those inside.⁴³⁵ Many Croats fled to Croat-held territory.⁴³⁶

135. Following the takeover of Dalj, hundreds of non-Serbs were arrested and held in inhumane conditions at makeshift prisons at the police and local TO headquarters in the *Dom kulture* and the *Zadruga* building.⁴³⁷ There they were interrogated, beaten and tortured.⁴³⁸ Milorad Stričević, the Dalj TO Head of Security, oversaw the mistreatment of detainees.⁴³⁹ Arkan and his men were frequently allowed into these prisons to beat detainees.⁴⁴⁰

136. Serb Forces looted non-Serb property.⁴⁴¹ Movement restrictions were imposed. Croat residents were forced to sign their property over to the local TO.⁴⁴²

137. On New Year's Eve of 1991, Arkan and his men destroyed the Catholic Church in Dalj.⁴⁴³ In Dalj Planina, the Catholic Church was robbed and its doors and windows were removed.⁴⁴⁴

(a) Murder of 11 non-Serb detainees on 21 September 1991⁴⁴⁵

138. In mid-September 1991, Hadžić brought approximately 25-30 Croat prisoners, under special police escort, to the Dalj police headquarters. He claimed the prisoners were “Ustashas” from Baranja and that they would stand trial for horrible war crimes they had allegedly committed.⁴⁴⁶

139. During the night of 21 to 22 September 1991, Hadžić and Arkan arrived at the police headquarters along with approximately 20 of Arkan’s soldiers. Hadžić ordered the release of two detainees.⁴⁴⁷ Arkan and his men took eleven other prisoners from the building and shot them.⁴⁴⁸

140. On 23 September 1991, the Dalj police commander prepared a report about this incident for his superiors, which was subsequently delivered to Hadžić by the Chief of the Vukovar Secretary of Internal Affairs (“SUP”). Within a matter of days the Vukovar SUP Chief was threatened by Arkan and sacked by Hadžić. The Dalj police commander was also later dismissed.⁴⁴⁹ This conduct emboldened Arkan and others to continue executing prisoners.

141. In early 1998, the remains of nine of the 11 prisoners taken by Arkan were exhumed from a well in Ćelije⁴⁵⁰ and from Daljski Atar.⁴⁵¹ The bodies of other victims killed by Arkan’s Tigers and the other Serb Forces were also found in these locations.⁴⁵²

(b) Murder of 28 non-Serb detainees around 4 October 1991⁴⁵³

142. In late September or early October 1991, the TO transferred a group of Croats captured in Baranja to the *Dom kulture*, where they were held for several days. The detainees were moved to the Dalj police headquarters at the *Zadruga* building,⁴⁵⁴ where they were interrogated by Stričević and badly beaten.⁴⁵⁵

143. On the night of 4 October 1991, Arkan and Stričević arrived at the police headquarters with approximately 20 of Arkan’s Tigers and several local TO members. After ordering the police members guarding the prisoners to leave,⁴⁵⁶ Arkan and his men beat and later shot 28 detainees.⁴⁵⁷

They dumped the bodies of the victims in the Danube River.⁴⁵⁸ The bodies of several victims were later discovered in the Danube in Novi Sad, Serbia.⁴⁵⁹

144. On 5 October 1991, the Dalj police commander investigated the incident and wrote a report informing his superiors of the killings.⁴⁶⁰ Although various SAO SBWS MUP and TO officials were informed,⁴⁶¹ the incident was not further investigated.⁴⁶²

145. At a meeting at the Dalj market shortly after this incident, Arkan publicly admitted to killing the prisoners.⁴⁶³

146. The remains of 21 victims were exhumed from the Novi Sad cemetery and a mass grave in Ilok.⁴⁶⁴

2. Erdut⁴⁶⁵

147. Erdut is located in Osijek municipality on the Danube River. In 1991, Erdut was a predominantly Croat village.⁴⁶⁶

148. In late July 1991, JNA units shelled Erdut from the Serbian side of the Danube.⁴⁶⁷ On 1 August 1991, the JNA and the TO attacked Erdut, causing the Croat population to flee.⁴⁶⁸ Several days after the attack, a local police unit and Arkan's Tigers established themselves in Erdut.⁴⁶⁹ Hadžić provided Arkan with the Erdut TO training centre, which became known as Arkan's training centre.⁴⁷⁰

149. Following the takeover of Erdut and Erdut Planina, a curfew was imposed and non-Serbs had their freedom of movement restricted.⁴⁷¹ Homes of non-Serbs were looted.⁴⁷² Non-Serbs needed the local police's approval to leave the village.⁴⁷³ They were also forced to sign over their

property to the local authorities.⁴⁷⁴ Many non-Serbs who remained were subjected to forced labour.⁴⁷⁵

150. Arkan set up a makeshift prison within the Erdut training centre,⁴⁷⁶ where non-Serbs were held.⁴⁷⁷ Detainees were interrogated, maltreated, beaten and murdered by Arkan's Tigers.⁴⁷⁸ The remains of many of these victims were discovered during exhumations of mass gravesites. Hadžić's government was seated next to Arkan's training centre, in the same compound.⁴⁷⁹

(a) Murder of twelve non-Serb detainees in Erdut on 10 November 1991⁴⁸⁰

151. On 9 November 1991, Arkan's Tigers, acting with the Erdut police and Security Staff of the Dalj TO, arrested a number of non-Serb villagers from Erdut, Dalj Planina and Erdut Planina.⁴⁸¹ The detainees were taken to the prison at Arkan's training centre in Erdut, where they were interrogated and badly beaten.⁴⁸² The same evening, one of the detainees, Mihajlo Pap *a.k.a.* Mišika was released and returned home.⁴⁸³ The following morning, one of Arkan's Tigers re-arrested him.⁴⁸⁴ The detainees were killed by Arkan and Stričević's men. Most were buried in Ćelije at the Catholic Cemetery and one victim was buried in Daljski Atar.⁴⁸⁵

(b) Murder of three non-Serb detainees in Erdut after 9 November 1991⁴⁸⁶

152. Several days after his abduction, Juliana Pap, the mother of Mihajlo, began looking for him and other missing family members. As a result, Mihajlo (Mile) Ulemek, a member of Arkan's Tigers, intervened with SNB Commander Bogić in order for the rest of the family to be killed. SNB members arrested Juliana Pap, her son Franjo Pap and the fiancée of her son Mihajlo Pap, Natalija Rakin, at their home in Erdut. They were executed near Lovački dom.⁴⁸⁷

153. Several days later, rumours of the disappearance of the Pap family spread through Erdut. Hadžić asked Bogić about the incident, who replied that it had been taken care of.⁴⁸⁸

154. The bodies of the victims were exhumed from a well in Borovo Selo.⁴⁸⁹

(c) Murder of five non-Serb detainees on 11 November 1991⁴⁹⁰

155. On 11 November 1991, members of Arkan's Tigers led by Mihaljo Ulemek arrested five non-Serb civilians in Klisa and two in Dalj and Bijelo Brdo.⁴⁹¹ The seven prisoners were transported to Erdut, held in a house opposite Arkan's training centre, and were repeatedly interrogated and beaten.⁴⁹² The prisoners were later detained at Arkan's training centre.⁴⁹³ On 13 November 1991, two detainees with Serb relatives were released.⁴⁹⁴

156. A few days later, villagers from Klisa went to Hadžić's government offices in Erdut to enquire about the fate of the remaining five detainees.⁴⁹⁵ They asked Hadžić why these men had been detained, to which he responded that this was not their business and walked away.⁴⁹⁶

157. The five detainees were executed and their remains were later exhumed from a mass grave in the village of Ćelije,⁴⁹⁷ where Arkan had a training base.⁴⁹⁸

(d) Murder of five non-Serb detainees on or around 10 December 1991⁴⁹⁹

158. On 10 December 1991, local TO members led by Arkan and local police arrested five non-Serbs from Erdut.⁵⁰⁰ The victims were taken to Arkan's training centre and subsequently killed.⁵⁰¹ The bodies of four victims were exhumed from a well in Daljski Atar.⁵⁰² Arkan's Tigers and other perpetrators disposed of the bodies of other scheduled victims in Daljski Atar.⁵⁰³

(e) Murder of seven non-Serb detainees in Erdut on 26 December 1991⁵⁰⁴

159. Between 22 and 25 December 1991, local TO members led by Arkan and local police arrested seven ethnic Hungarian and Croat civilians in Erdut and took them to Arkan's training centre.⁵⁰⁵ On 26 December 1991, they were shot and killed.⁵⁰⁶ The bodies of the victims were found in a mass grave in Daljski Atar.⁵⁰⁷

(f) Murder of four non-Serb detainees in Erdut on 21 February 1992⁵⁰⁸

160. On 21 February 1992, Arkan, local TO and SNB members arrested four members of the Albert family, all non-Serbs, in Erdut. They were interrogated at Arkan's training centre and then murdered.⁵⁰⁹ Their bodies were buried in a mass grave in Daljski Atar.⁵¹⁰

(g) Murder of Marija Senaši in Erdut on 3 June 1992⁵¹¹

161. On 3 June 1992, SNB members, together with Arkan's Tigers, arrested Marija Senaši, an ethnic Hungarian, in Erdut.⁵¹² She was subsequently murdered and her body was thrown into a well in Dalj Planina.⁵¹³

3. Aljmaš⁵¹⁴

162. When Serb Forces attacked Erdut and Dalj on 1 August 1991, many Croats from the neighbouring village of Aljmaš fled to Croat-held territory.⁵¹⁵ Croat homes were subsequently looted.⁵¹⁶

163. In early September 1991, Serb Forces, including soldiers of the JNA's 51st Mechanised Brigade, seized Aljmaš,⁵¹⁷ from which Croat inhabitants had fled or been expelled.⁵¹⁸ Arkan's

Tigers subsequently mined the Catholic Church causing severe damage to it.⁵¹⁹ The Church was destroyed in August 1993.⁵²⁰

164. After the takeover, local TO members looted homes.⁵²¹ Croats were also detained, had their movement restricted and their homes subjected to random searches.⁵²²

4. Sarvaš⁵²³

165. Following the takeover of Aljmaš,⁵²⁴ in early September 1991, Serb Forces, including soldiers of the JNA's 51st Mechanised Brigade and members of the Bijelo Brdo TO, attacked the neighbouring Croat majority village of Sarvaš.⁵²⁵ JNA tanks fired indiscriminately at the village.⁵²⁶ By the end of the attack, the village was depleted of its inhabitants and heavily damaged.⁵²⁷

5. Borovo Selo⁵²⁸

166. Following the attack against Dalj in August 1991, non-Serbs were detained at detention facilities in Borovo Selo, including as many as 100 at a stable or workshop⁵²⁹ in the village.⁵³⁰ Some prisoners held at this facility were killed.⁵³¹ Others were beaten and mistreated by local Serbian policemen.⁵³² Some prisoners were exchanged.⁵³³ Others were transferred to different detention facilities in the area, including the Dalj police station.⁵³⁴ Many non-Serbs were also imprisoned at the Youth Discotheque in Borovo Selo, a facility operated by the local TO.⁵³⁵ Non-Serb detainees were beaten and forced to perform labour for local Serbs.⁵³⁶

6. The Takeover of Vukovar⁵³⁷

167. Prior to the conflict in 1991, the ethnic composition of the city of Vukovar and its suburb of Borovo was roughly 42.4% Croat and 38.3% Serb. The remaining roughly 19.2% belonged to other

ethnicities or declared themselves to be Yugoslav.⁵³⁸ Between 25 June 1991 and 31 December 1993, roughly 20,320 people were displaced from Vukovar and Borovo, of whom roughly 97.9% were non-Serb.⁵³⁹

168. The capture of Vukovar was essential to the execution of the common criminal purpose. Strategically significant,⁵⁴⁰ the SAO SBWS leadership considered the city its future capital.⁵⁴¹ This view was shared by other JCE members.⁵⁴²

169. The city of Vukovar and its immediate environs were shelled with growing intensity from June to August 1991.⁵⁴³ Between September and October 1991, the severity of the attacks increased.⁵⁴⁴ From early October until 18 November 1991, Serb Forces launched constant and indiscriminate operations in and around the city, often deploying JNA aircraft, artillery, tanks and rockets.⁵⁴⁵ Serb Forces involved in these attacks included: the JNA; the Republic of Serbia TO; the local TO; units of the MUP/SDB Serbia, including a unit led by Captain Dragan and Arkan's Tigers; and Serb volunteer units, including Šešelj's Men.⁵⁴⁶ They faced poorly equipped Croat fighters.⁵⁴⁷

170. On 18 November 1991, Vukovar fell to the Serb Forces.⁵⁴⁸ It was decimated.⁵⁴⁹

7. Attacks against Towns and Villages South and East of the City of Vukovar

171. As Serb Forces laid waste to the city of Vukovar and its immediate environs, they captured other predominantly Croat towns and villages in the municipality of Vukovar, including Sotin, Tovarnik, Lovas, Bapska, Šarengrad, Ilok and Opatovac.⁵⁵⁰

172. The captured territory lay in an arc bordering the Danube, running south and east from the city of Vukovar.



This is a cut-out from the map of SBWS in Annex A.

173. Capturing this territory, and blocking Croat access to the Danube, was essential to establishing a broad corridor linking the Republic of Serbia and SBWS.⁵⁵¹

174. By mid-to-late October 1991, Serb Forces succeeded in securing control of this territory and driving away most non-Serbs living there. Expulsions continued through 1993. Between 25 June 1991 and 31 December 1993, roughly 32,000 people, of whom 98.4% were non-Serb, were expelled from the municipality of Vukovar.⁵⁵²

(a) Sotin⁵⁵³

175. Sotin is southeast of Vukovar on the Danube River. Prior to the conflict in 1991, Sotin was predominantly Croat. On 28 August 1991, the JNA attacked Sotin.⁵⁵⁴ That day, JNA fighter jets fired at non-Serbs attending a funeral.⁵⁵⁵ Later in the day, Serb Forces, including the JNA, attacked residential areas in Sotin with tanks, forcing many Croat residents to flee to the neighbouring village of Lovas.⁵⁵⁶

(b) Tovarnik⁵⁵⁷

176. Prior to the conflict in 1991, Tovarnik was predominantly Croat with a Serb minority.⁵⁵⁸

177. On or around 20 September 1991, JNA tanks shelled public buildings, homes and the Catholic Church in Tovarnik.⁵⁵⁹ There was minimal resistance from within Tovarnik.⁵⁶⁰ On or around 22 September 1991, Serb Forces, including the JNA and local TO, entered Tovarnik and fired indiscriminately at homes.⁵⁶¹

178. Many Croats were forced to flee to the neighbouring villages of Lovas and Ilok.⁵⁶² There was extensive destruction in Tovarnik including to homes and the Catholic Church.⁵⁶³ Serb Forces also looted property.⁵⁶⁴

179. On or around 23 September 1991, Serb Forces, including the JNA, members of Serbian volunteer units, members of the local TO and members of a special MUP Serbia unit led by Captain Dragan gathered many local residents and expelled them from SBWS.⁵⁶⁵

(c) Lovas⁵⁶⁶

180. Prior to the conflict in 1991, Lovas was a predominantly Croat village with a Serb minority.⁵⁶⁷ By the end of December 1991, most of Lovas's Croat residents had fled to Croat-held territory.⁵⁶⁸

181. JNA tanks fired into Lovas in early September 1991 damaging the Catholic Church.⁵⁶⁹

182. Fearing that Lovas would be targeted like other villages attacked by Serb Forces, representatives from Lovas negotiated with the JNA beginning on around 27 September 1991.⁵⁷⁰ At these negotiations, JNA Colonel Milić Jovanović threatened to "destroy" Lovas.⁵⁷¹ Similarly, JNA Colonel Zelimir Petrović warned that if a single shot was fired, the JNA would "flatten the

village.”⁵⁷² Inhabitants gave the few weapons which they had to the JNA.⁵⁷³ Still dissatisfied, JNA Lieutenant Colonel Radosavkić warned that Lovas would “suffer the same fate as Tovarnik.”⁵⁷⁴

183. After the JNA ultimatum, many villagers, including refugees from neighbouring villages, fled to Ilok.⁵⁷⁵ Between around 1 and 7 October 1991, JNA tanks fired at Lovas damaging homes and the Catholic Church.⁵⁷⁶ This drove more villagers to Ilok.⁵⁷⁷

184. A full-scale attack against Lovas, to which there was no resistance, occurred on 10 October 1991.⁵⁷⁸ The JNA shelled Croat-populated areas.⁵⁷⁹ Many Croats fled to Ilok and the neighbouring village of Mohovo that day.⁵⁸⁰ After the shelling stopped, Serb Forces entered Lovas. They beat and raped non-Serb villagers,⁵⁸¹ searched, looted and destroyed Croat homes and killed non-Serb inhabitants.⁵⁸² Other Croat homes were used to accommodate members of the Serb Forces.⁵⁸³ Croat residents who left Lovas had to sign a document transferring their property to the SAO SBWS.⁵⁸⁴ Serbs then occupied their homes.⁵⁸⁵ The homes of Serbs remained untouched.⁵⁸⁶

185. The movements of Croats who remained in the village were tightly controlled.⁵⁸⁷

186. Beginning on or around 10 October 1991, some local Croats had to go to the *Zadruga* building in Lovas,⁵⁸⁸ where they received forced labour assignments.⁵⁸⁹

187. On or around 17 October 1991, Ljuban Devetak, the local leader in Lovas,⁵⁹⁰ ordered all men of military age to assemble in front of the *Zadruga* building.⁵⁹¹ Those who responded to this order and assembled in front of the *Zadruga* building were all Croat.⁵⁹² Some were assigned to perform forced labour. They were taken to the home of a Serb and beaten.⁵⁹³ Approximately 70

Croats remained in the courtyard of the *Zadruga* building where they were mistreated.⁵⁹⁴ Some were beaten and stabbed to death.⁵⁹⁵ Republic of Serbia TO soldiers from Valjevo (Serbia) and Serb volunteers, including members of the Dušan Silni volunteer unit, participated in their mistreatment.⁵⁹⁶

(i) Murder of 21 Croats at a minefield on the outskirts of Lovas on 18 October 1991⁵⁹⁷

188. On 18 October 1991,⁵⁹⁸ soldiers from the Serbian TO unit from Valjevo and the Dušan Silni volunteer unit⁵⁹⁹ took roughly 50 Croats from the *Zadruga* building to a mined clover field on the outskirts of Lovas.⁶⁰⁰ En route, a Serb soldier shot and killed a detainee who could not walk.⁶⁰¹

189. At the clover field, the detainees were forced to walk in a line, sweeping their feet to check for mines.⁶⁰² When a detainee triggered a mine, the Serb soldiers accompanying them fired at the detainees.⁶⁰³ In total, 21 Croats died at the clover field that day,⁶⁰⁴ killed by mine explosions or gunfire.⁶⁰⁵ Other detainees were injured.⁶⁰⁶ The remains of the dead were recovered from a mass grave in Lovas.⁶⁰⁷

190. The involvement of soldiers from the TO unit from Valjevo and the Dušan Silni volunteer unit became widely known and was reported up the JNA chain of command, and reached MUP Serbia.⁶⁰⁸ [REDACTED].⁶⁰⁹ Although the SAO SBWS police were informed, they did not conduct an investigation.⁶¹⁰ [REDACTED].⁶¹¹

(d) Bapska⁶¹²

191. Prior to the conflict in 1991, Bapska was a predominantly Croat village with a Serb minority.⁶¹³ By 15 October 1991, approximately 500 people remained in Bapska,⁶¹⁴ most of whom were elderly.⁶¹⁵

192. On around 28 September 1991, JNA Major Slobodan Barjaktarević issued an ultimatum to handover weapons, failing which, Bapska “will cease to exist on a geographical map.”⁶¹⁶

193. Beginning on 4 October 1991, the JNA fired heavy artillery at the predominantly Croat part of Bapska, damaging the Catholic Church.⁶¹⁷ JNA tanks entered Bapska on 5 October 1991, and fired indiscriminately damaging numerous homes and causing further damage to the Catholic Church.⁶¹⁸ On 7 October 1991, Serb volunteers torched Croat homes.⁶¹⁹ The JNA periodically shelled Bapska until around 14 October 1991.⁶²⁰

194. Many residents of Bapska fled the village. Some left SBWS altogether, while others went to Ilok.⁶²¹

(e) Šarengrad⁶²²

195. Prior to the conflict in 1991, Šarengrad was a predominantly Croat village with a Serb minority.⁶²³ By the end of October 1991, the only Croats left in Šarengrad were the elderly and unwell, some of whom were later expelled in 1992.⁶²⁴

196. On 4 and 5 October 1991, the JNA fired artillery indiscriminately damaging homes and the Orthodox Church.⁶²⁵ In fear, many inhabitants began fleeing to Ilok on 5 October 1991.⁶²⁶ On 7 October 1991, the JNA presented village representatives with an ultimatum demanding the

surrender of ZNG soldiers and all weapons, failing which, Šarengrad would be destroyed.⁶²⁷ More villagers fled after this ultimatum.⁶²⁸

197. Beginning on 7 October 1991, Serb volunteers entered Šarengrad and looted and destroyed Croat homes.⁶²⁹ [REDACTED]⁶³⁰

(f) Ilok⁶³¹

198. Prior to the conflict in 1991, Ilok was a Croat majority town with a population of roughly 6,775 people, of whom approximately 7.1% were Serb.⁶³²

199. By early October 1991, there were over 10,000 people in Ilok as non-Serbs fled neighbouring settlements, including Tovarnik, Bapska, Šarengrad and Lovas.⁶³³ By mid-October 1991, Ilok's population reached approximately 15,000.⁶³⁴ Many who fled to Ilok spoke of the damage and destruction wrought by Serb Forces in their villages.⁶³⁵

200. Fearing a similar fate, officials from Ilok and neighbouring villages negotiated with the JNA beginning on 7 October 1991.⁶³⁶ JNA Colonel Petar Grahovac demanded the surrender of weapons and the identification of local civilian protection unit members.⁶³⁷ Failing this, Grahovac threatened that "Ilok will be destroyed within 2 hours."⁶³⁸ Later, JNA General Dragoljub Arandelović demanded that weapons be handed over, homes be searched and that the JNA be allowed to assume control of Ilok.⁶³⁹ Arandelović threatened to "level Ilok to the ground" if these terms were not met.⁶⁴⁰ Arandelović justified his demands by suggesting that Serbs in Ilok were at risk.⁶⁴¹ Kertes participated in the negotiations for the surrender of Ilok.⁶⁴²

201. A referendum was held on 13 October 1991 to determine whether to accept the JNA's terms.⁶⁴³ Fearing the consequences if they stayed, 73% of the voters favoured leaving the village.⁶⁴⁴

202. On 17 October 1991, 11,000 people travelled from Ilok to Croat-held territory leaving behind approximately 500 Croats who were predominantly elderly or infirm.⁶⁴⁵ Some Croats in the convoy were arrested at checkpoints and taken to detention camps in Serbia.⁶⁴⁶ SNB members were present in Bačka Palanka (Serbia) and assisted the JNA in identifying suspected ZNG members.⁶⁴⁷

203. Following the departure of the convoy, ethnic Serbs seized the homes of Croats.⁶⁴⁸ Croats who stayed were taken to the police headquarters in Ilok and mistreated.⁶⁴⁹ Some were forced to search for mines.⁶⁵⁰

(g) Opatovac⁶⁵¹

204. As non-Serbs in Ilok were abandoning the town on 17 October 1991, villagers in Opatovac were negotiating with the JNA to avoid being attacked.⁶⁵² The JNA's conditions that weapons be handed over and homes be searched were ultimately accepted.⁶⁵³ Many Croats however had already fled Opatovac having heard of the crimes committed by Serb Forces from those who fled neighbouring villages.⁶⁵⁴

205. After the JNA took Opatovac, non-Serbs were required to obtain authorisation from the local authorities to pass through checkpoints around the village.⁶⁵⁵ The homes of non-Serbs were also arbitrarily searched⁶⁵⁶ and looted.⁶⁵⁷ Although the JNA instructed that all weapons be handed over, only weapons belonging to non-Serbs were confiscated.⁶⁵⁸

206. Many non-Serbs also performed forced labour.⁶⁵⁹

207. Non-Serb males were detained at the police station.⁶⁶⁰ Women and children had to report there each morning.⁶⁶¹ Serb Forces, including the local TO, interrogated and mistreated non-Serbs at the police station.⁶⁶² Non-Serbs were also mistreated and sexually assaulted in their homes.⁶⁶³

208. From late October 1991, non-Serbs were expelled from Opatovac.⁶⁶⁴ Many were transferred to detention facilities in Serbia.⁶⁶⁵ Their homes were used to accommodate the JNA and the local TO.⁶⁶⁶

8. The Fall of Vukovar and its Aftermath⁶⁶⁷

209. On 18 November 1991, the city of Vukovar fell to Serb Forces.⁶⁶⁸ Serb Forces looted the city and its immediate environs.⁶⁶⁹ Thousands of non-Serbs were expelled to Croat-held territory and to detention facilities in Serbia.⁶⁷⁰ In addition, non-Serbs were detained, beaten and murdered at various locations in and around Vukovar, and in Dalj.⁶⁷¹

(a) Detention of hundreds of Croats and non-Serbs at Vukovar Hospital and at the JNA Vukovar barracks⁶⁷²

210. On 17 November 1991, the JNA stopped shelling the Vukovar Hospital and encouraged civilians to gather there for evacuation.⁶⁷³ The next day, approximately 750 people were waiting to be evacuated from the hospital.⁶⁷⁴ Many more arrived in the next two days.⁶⁷⁵ There was a lack of food and facilities at the hospital.⁶⁷⁶

211. On 19 November, JNA soldiers, reserve soldiers, local TO members and Serb volunteers entered the hospital compound.⁶⁷⁷

212. Beginning on 20 November, many non-Serbs were expelled to Croat-held territory.⁶⁷⁸

213. On 20 November 1991 the JNA also ordered a group numbering approximately 250 onto buses⁶⁷⁹ guarded by JNA military policemen.⁶⁸⁰ They were transported to the JNA barracks a short distance away.⁶⁸¹ Serb Forces, including JNA soldiers, local TO soldiers and Šešelj's Men, were present at the barracks compound,⁶⁸² and beat some of those brought there.⁶⁸³

214. On 20 November 1991, the SAO SBWS government met at the Velopromet facility in Vukovar to decide the fate of those captured in and around Vukovar.⁶⁸⁴ The meeting was attended by, amongst others, Hadžić, who came to the meeting with Arkan;⁶⁸⁵ SAO SBWS Minister of Agriculture⁶⁸⁶ Slavko Dokmanović; SAO SBWS Justice Minister⁶⁸⁷ Vojin Suša; Ljuban Devetak, the local leader in Lovas; President of the SAO SBWS Assembly Ilija Končarević; SSNO Colonel Bogdan Vujić; and General Panić.⁶⁸⁸ Hadžić echoed the comments of other participants who demanded that the JNA transfer those suspected of participating in military operations to the SAO SBWS authorities.⁶⁸⁹ During an interview later in the day, Hadžić confirmed an agreement with the JNA "to have these Ustashas detained in our detention camps, here in the surroundings of Vukovar."⁶⁹⁰

(b) Murder of at least 200 Croat and other non-Serbs in and around Ovčara on 20-21 November 1991⁶⁹¹

215. Further to the agreement which Hadžić concluded with the JNA, on the afternoon of 20 November 1991, the approximately 200 Croat and other non-Serb detainees taken from the Vukovar hospital to the JNA barracks, were transferred to Ovčara farm.⁶⁹² The detainees were taken to a hangar on the farm.⁶⁹³ At the farm, detainees were stripped of their belongings and brutally beaten by Serb Forces, including Šešelj's Men, JNA soldiers and members of the local TO.⁶⁹⁴

216. That afternoon, a number of detainees were killed in and around the hangar.⁶⁹⁵

217. In the evening, the Military Police of the JNA's 80th Motorised Brigade, which was responsible for protecting the detainees, withdrew from the hangar, effectively handing the detainees to the local TO and Šešelj's Men.⁶⁹⁶

218. On the orders of the local TO Commanders, Miroljub Vujović and Stanko Vujanović,⁶⁹⁷ the detainees were taken to an area between Ovčara and Grabovo, where a large pit had been dug earlier in the day on the orders of a JNA officer.⁶⁹⁸ There, Serb Forces, including members of the local TO and Šešelj's Men, executed prisoners.⁶⁹⁹ At least one JNA soldier took part in the killings.⁷⁰⁰

219. The remains of 200 people were exhumed from the pit in 1996.⁷⁰¹ Almost all of the victims were of Croatian ethnicity.⁷⁰²

(c) Murder of at least 17 non-Serbs at Velepromet beginning on 19 November 1991⁷⁰³

220. On 19 November 1991, hundreds of non-Serbs were taken by Serb Forces from the Vukovar Hospital to the Velepromet⁷⁰⁴ facility.⁷⁰⁵ Some of the non-Serbs taken to Ovčara farm on 20 November were separated, and transferred to Velepromet.⁷⁰⁶ Conditions at Velepromet were poor.⁷⁰⁷ Detainees were robbed of their valuables, interrogated and severely abused.⁷⁰⁸ At least 17 non-Serbs were killed.⁷⁰⁹ Serb Forces, including Arkan's Tigers, Šešelj's Men, the JNA and the local TO, perpetrated these crimes.⁷¹⁰ The remains of 14 victims were recovered in and around Vukovar.⁷¹¹ Many of those who survived their detention in Velepromet were transferred to detention facilities in Serbia.⁷¹²

(d) Murder of 35 non-Serb detainees in and around Dalj on or around 20 November 1991⁷¹³

221. Following Hadžić's demand to retain non-Serbs suspected of participating in military operations,⁷¹⁴ the JNA transported many captured persons to detention facilities in Dalj on or around 20 November 1991.⁷¹⁵ Non-Serbs were separated out.⁷¹⁶ Serb Forces, including the local TO, identified those suspected of participating in the defence of Vukovar.⁷¹⁷ Serb Forces, including the local TO, interrogated and beat these non-Serbs,⁷¹⁸ and killed at least 35 of them.⁷¹⁹ The remains of many victims were exhumed from mass graves at the Dalj Catholic Cemetery and Lovas farm.⁷²⁰

9. Laslovo and Ernestinovo⁷²¹

222. On or around 20 November 1991, Serb forces, including soldiers of the JNA's Osijek Armoured Brigade, 51st Mechanised Brigade and Arkan's Tigers, captured the predominantly Croat villages of Laslovo and Ernestinovo, causing significant damage to them.⁷²² Non-Serbs fled Ernestinovo through a corridor which had been left open.⁷²³ Others were bussed to Croat-held territory.⁷²⁴ Operations against these villages involving the local TO and Serbian volunteers had begun as early as September 1991.⁷²⁵

10. Detention Facilities in Serbia⁷²⁶

(a) Military Prison, Šid⁷²⁷

223. From late September 1991, non-Serbs captured by Serb Forces in areas around Vukovar and Illok, including Opatovac and Tovarnik, were taken to the military prison in Šid.⁷²⁸ Women, children and the elderly were among those imprisoned there.⁷²⁹ Detainees were threatened and beaten.⁷³⁰ Female detainees were sexually assaulted by military personnel responsible for

interrogating prisoners.⁷³¹ Detainees were transferred to other detention facilities, including the agricultural complex in Begejci and the military prison in Sremska Mitrovica.⁷³²

(b) Agricultural Complex, Begejci⁷³³ and Military Barracks, Zrenjanin⁷³⁴

224. The detention facility in the village of Begejci was housed in an abandoned agricultural complex.⁷³⁵ It operated from around October until late December 1991.⁷³⁶ A military police detachment comprised mostly of JNA reservists secured the facility.⁷³⁷ Detainees included women, children and the elderly.⁷³⁸ Most detainees were Croat.⁷³⁹

225. Many were beaten on arrival by military policemen. For many, beatings continued throughout their detention.⁷⁴⁰ Detainees were also forced to trample on and beat each other, threatened with execution, bitten by guard dogs⁷⁴¹ and raped.⁷⁴² When an elderly prisoner died from his injuries, the camp authorities did not investigate the matter.⁷⁴³

226. Detainees had insufficient protection from the cold, received insufficient food and medical attention, and hygiene was poor.⁷⁴⁴ Detainees performed forced labour and were threatened and beaten while doing so.⁷⁴⁵

227. Some detainees were temporarily transferred to other facilities, including the military barracks in Zrenjanin, where they were beaten, before being returned to Begejci.⁷⁴⁶

228. Detainees were eventually exchanged or transferred to other detention facilities, including the military prison in Sremska Mitrovica.⁷⁴⁷

(c) Agricultural Farm, Stajićevo⁷⁴⁸

229. Beginning around 19 November 1991, the JNA transported many of those captured in and around Vukovar to the detention facility at the Stajićevo agricultural farm.⁷⁴⁹ Those sent to Stajićevo were predominantly non-Serb.⁷⁵⁰

230. Upon their arrival, JNA soldiers, military police, Serb volunteers, Serb police officers and Serb civilians beat detainees, sometimes killing them.⁷⁵¹

231. Soon after their arrival, many detainees were robbed of their valuables.⁷⁵²

232. Detainees were crowded together in sub-zero temperatures.⁷⁵³ Many fell ill due to the cold.⁷⁵⁴ Detainees received insufficient food, water and medicine.⁷⁵⁵ Those who identified themselves as Serbs received better treatment.⁷⁵⁶

233. Detainees were beaten throughout their detention.⁷⁵⁷ Some died from the beatings.⁷⁵⁸

234. By late December 1991, non-Serb detainees were exchanged and sent to Croat-held territory, or transferred to other detention facilities, including the military prison in Sremska Mitrovica.⁷⁵⁹

(d) Military Prison, Sremska Mitrovica⁷⁶⁰

235. The military prison in Sremska Mitrovica functioned as a prison for non-Serbs from Croatia from around 13 November 1991.⁷⁶¹ The SSNO and JNA security organs operated the facility.⁷⁶² After Vukovar fell, scores of non-Serbs, including the elderly and children, were transferred to this

prison.⁷⁶³ Many were transferred to Sremska Mitrovica when the Stajićevo and Begejci detention facilities shutdown around the end of December 1991.⁷⁶⁴

236. When they arrived, many detainees were severely beaten by prison guards, military policeman and local policemen.⁷⁶⁵ Many detainees were also ordered to turn over their valuables which were never returned to them.⁷⁶⁶

237. Many detainees were beaten and threatened throughout their detention.⁷⁶⁷ Some died from injuries they suffered.⁷⁶⁸

238. Detainees, including the elderly and children, were crowded into prison cells.⁷⁶⁹ Hygiene was poor.⁷⁷⁰ The injured received inadequate medical attention.⁷⁷¹ Prisoners laboured for lengthy periods. Some cleaned the floor with their bare hands for up to ten hours at a time.⁷⁷²

239. In a media interview on 20 November 1991, Hadžić stated that he had “personally taken the responsibility to bring [...] back” the “Ustashas” who were transferred to Sremska Mitrovica.⁷⁷³ Hadžić visited the prison⁷⁷⁴ with SAO SBWS Justice Minister Vojin Šusa.⁷⁷⁵ Hadžić and others also interrogated,⁷⁷⁶ threatened,⁷⁷⁷ and beat detainees.⁷⁷⁸ The prison commander, Colonel Jugoslav Maksimović, allowed Suša and local SAO SBWS judges to supervise interrogations.⁷⁷⁹

240. Detainees were eventually exchanged or sent to Croat-held territory.⁷⁸⁰ Exchanges began in late November 1991, continuing through August 1992.⁷⁸¹

11. Crimes in 1992 and 1993⁷⁸²

241. Throughout 1992 and 1993, Serb Forces, including the RSK MUP and TO, volunteer units and MUP Serbia/SDB special units (including the JPN/JATD and Arkan's Tigers) committed crimes with impunity forcing non-Serbs to flee the RSK.⁷⁸³ Non-Serbs were robbed, threatened, beaten, sexually assaulted, unlawfully detained and killed; their homes were looted, burnt and destroyed; their livestock was killed and their places of worship were damaged and destroyed.⁷⁸⁴

For example:

- As discussed above, on 21 February 1992, Arkan, local TO and SNB members arrested four members of the Albert family in Erdut, and later murdered them.⁷⁸⁵
- On 4 May 1992, members of a special unit of SDB Serbia abducted and killed five non-Serbs in the village of Grabovac.⁷⁸⁶ The remains of the victims were later found in an area near Tivkeš in Beli Manistar.⁷⁸⁷
- As discussed above, on 3 June 1992, SNB members, together with Arkan's Tigers, arrested Marija Senaši, an ethnic Hungarian, and subsequently murdered her.⁷⁸⁸

242. Many non-Serbs were pressured to leave through discriminatory measures.⁷⁸⁹ Local authorities and Serb Forces physically expelled many other non-Serbs from their homes. For example:

- On or around 26 or 27 March 1992, 61 JNA reservists expelled non-Serbs from Tovarnik and Nijemci.⁷⁹⁰
- On 8 April 1992, Croats were assembled in the centre of Aljmaš, robbed of their personal possessions and forcibly expelled to Croat-held territory.⁷⁹¹
- On or around 9 April 1992, Arkan's Tigers forced non-Serbs in Erdut, who were mostly the elderly, women and children, to board buses and transported them to Croat-held territory.⁷⁹²
- On 20 April 1992, roughly 400 non-Serbs, many of whom were elderly, were expelled from the village of Marinci.⁷⁹³ Hadžić instructed the local police to cooperate with UNPROFOR when escorting the non-Serbs to Croat-held territory.⁷⁹⁴
- Hadžić was also involved in the expulsion of non-Serbs from Tenja, including a group of 100 civilians who were expelled in April 1992.⁷⁹⁵

243. Between March and June 1992, there were many other incidents in which Serb Forces and the local authorities expelled non-Serbs from villages in Sector East including, but not limited to, Bapska, Čakovci, Cerić, Dalj, Ilača, Ilok, Lovas, Marinci, Mikluševci, Nijemci, Petrovci, Šarengrad, Sarvaš, Tenja, Tompojevci, Tovarnik, Vukovar, Opatovac, Ernestinovo, Bokšić and Petlovac.⁷⁹⁶ [REDACTED].⁷⁹⁷ Many non-Serbs were also expelled from the Baranja region.⁷⁹⁸ [REDACTED]⁷⁹⁹

244. Serb Forces also expelled non-Serbs from other villages and towns in the RSK in 1992 and 1993, including from Knin, Kistanje, Vrpolje, Kruševac, Obrovac Škabrnja, Hrvatska Dubica, Slunj, Podlapača, Ljubotić, Medvida, Benkovac, Glina, Korana, Korenica, Zaluznica, and Vrlika.⁸⁰⁰ Non-Serbs in other villages in Sectors West, North and South were also expelled and faced other forms of persecution during this period.⁸⁰¹

245. The arrival of Serbs⁸⁰² placed greater pressure on non-Serbs to leave. Serbs often terrorized non-Serbs, forced non-Serbs from their homes, claimed the homes of non-Serbs who had already fled or were provided these homes by the local authorities.⁸⁰³




SAO's as Declared and as Controlled by the end of 1991
