THIS TRIAL CHAMBER of the International Tribunal for the Prosecution of Persons Responsible for Serious Violations of International Humanitarian Law Committed in the Territory of the former Yugoslavia since 1991 ("International Tribunal"),

NOTING that the original Indictment against Goran Hadžić was confirmed on 4 June 2004;¹

NOTING that the Registry has advised that the Accused, Goran Hadžić, has been arrested and soon will be transferred to the seat of the International Tribunal pursuant to Rule 62 of the Rules of Procedure and Evidence of the International Tribunal ("Rules");

NOTING the "Order Assigning a Case to a Trial Chamber", issued by the Acting President of the International Tribunal on 21 July 2011;

CONSIDERING Rule 64 of the Rules which provides that an accused shall be detained upon transfer to the seat of the International Tribunal;

PURSUANT TO Rules 54 and 64 of the Rules;

HEREBY ORDERS the detention on remand of Goran Hadžić, upon his transfer to the seat of the International Tribunal, and **DIRECTS** the Commanding Officer of the United Nations Detention Unit in The Hague to detain him until further order.
